PETITIONERS STATE: The number of petitioners required by M.S. 414.06, Sub. 1, to commence this proceeding is: all of the property owners if the area is less than 40 acres; or 75% or more of the property owners in number if the area is more than 40 acres.

It is herby requested by:

- X All the property owners, the area is less than 40 acres; to detach certain properties described herein from the City of <u>Lanesboro</u> and make a part of the Township of <u>Holt.</u>
  - 1. There are 2 property owners in the area proposed for detachment.
  - 2. <u>All property owners have signed this petition.</u>
  - 3. The property is situated within the City of <u>Lanesboro</u>, abuts the municipal boundary and the boundary of the Township of <u>Holt</u>, in the County of <u>Fillmore</u>.

    The petitioned area abuts on the city's <u>East boundary</u>.
  - 4. The property proposed for detachment is rural in character and not developed for urban residential, commercial, or industrial purposes.
  - 5. The number of acres in the property proposed for detachment is <u>12.86 acres</u> and is described as follows:
    - See Attachment A for description of parcel which contains 12.86 acres.
  - 6. The reason detachment is requested is: The land is not planned for any type of development and does not lend itself favorably for improvements; The majority of the acreage is currently cropland and woods; The city does not have any type of urban or rural districting, therefore, valuation and taxation are calculated identically throughout the city limits, with or without improvements. (Continued on Page 2)

The parcel being requested for detachment is classified by the County as Agricultural land, (See Attachment B)

The City did pass a resolution in agreement to the detachment, but at a later meeting brought it back for discussion (See Attachment C, which includes minutes from 3 consecutive council meetings dealing with the request for detachment). This was not done according to the League of Minnesota Cities guidelines, as the person making the motion to reconsider was not on the prevailing side when the vote was taken on the original motion. Therefore, this person should not have been allowed to make a motion to have the resolution in agreement of detachment reconsidered, Secondly, if the detachment was to be brought up for reconsideration it needed to be done before the previous meeting minutes were approved. (See Attachment D, which is out of the handbook for League of Minnesota cities)

- 7. The number of residents in the area proposed for detachment is 2.
- 8. The number and character of buildings on said property is: One single family dwelling and a 48 X 48 pole shed on parcel.
- 9. Public improvements on said property are: City water is supplied to parcel, but was installed at the property owners expense. No city paid public improvements are located on this parcel.







The minutes from the July 19<sup>th</sup> meeting were approved with a motion from Halvorson, second Drake, motion carried.

## <u>Persons with business before the council</u> <u>Jeff Hebl- Concerns on recent Detachment</u>

Hebl presented himself to the council with the concerns he also had put into a letter to all the council members. He believed that the council should look at reconsidering their decisions based on the facts that 1) The property was located within city limits when it was purchased and developed, therefore taxes should have been of concern prior to purchasing and building. 2) By allowing the property to detach, takes tax revenue away from the city, putting more tax burden on the rest of the tax payers. Loosing taxable property will certainly have a trickle down effect to the rest of the tax payers. 3) Tax payer's money was spent to put utilities in place in hopes of attracting future development and tax revenue. Approving this detachment because of high tax concerns is taking revenue away from the city.

Where will it stop if we keep letting people petition out. There are several additional homes that are receiving the exact same services as the property requesting detachment, should the city continue to allow this detachment, I myself also am requesting to be included in the petition to the state for detachment from the city.

Wagner still has to have approval from the State and also could just apply to the State himself, but would not be as easy if the City approved first.

Hanson being absent from the meeting that night questioned City Attorney Tom Manion what the procedures are now that would follow. Manion stated no written documents were made and the City could move to reconsider with no risk to them.

Hanson made motion for discussion to reconsider the motion of detachment, second O'Connor.

O'Connor also was absent at the pervious meeting and would like to review and take more time to look into a rural and urban district.

Hanson made motion to reconsider the detachment, second O'Connor. Mayor Rahn called for a roll call vote. O'Connor-yes, Hanson-yes, Drake-no, Halvorson-no, Rahn-yes 3-yes, 2-no, motion passed.

Hanson said they could possibly ask Dave Kienhe from the Assessor Office to come in again for a better understanding.

The council will bring this matter up at the next meeting and request Jim Wagner to come to that meeting.

#### Rob Wagner-Petition out of City Limits

Wagner stated that he feels his situation is different than Jim's his father.

He feels that he put in his own well and septic system and only is receiving electric from the City. He was charged with only 30% of the cost for the line hook up to his place. Hanson said that they need to do some research on this matter also.

## Gene Mensing- Open Lots on Parkway

There have been several complaints about the appearance of the lots with all the bikes and canoes.

Mensing stated that he addressed all the business people downtown and none of them had a problem, they would rather have something in the lots than having them empty. Purchasing a near by building when all the remodeling is done will eliminate the need for using the lots. Employing several people and staying busy is all they are trying to do,

seem to be getting harder to keep the business going as 3 new businesses have opened around the area.

Mayor Rahn commented he didn't have a problem with it.

Dave Applen owner of the Windy Mesa says Mensing parked a trailer in the lot next to his building wall for safety issues since the fire and commented that he has not heard one complaint from any tourist on the lot.

Carla Noack said glad to see he is still trying to run things and possibly some of the concern came when the Chamber was working on beautification of the City.

Clorees Haug was glad to see that they are there, along with being survivors.

Hanson commented that after BB Day's the sidewalks will be done and that will be a big improvement.

#### **Bass Pond Parking Lot**

The Mensings along with another canoe business have been parking their canoes and trailers in the lot. Now some of the other business places would like to use and store their trucks, trailers and etc. and it seems the lot is getting several marks in it from the trailers. Kathleen Gruett said she was being billed for 33 feet, and stated that only 30 feet were her property the other 3 feet belonged to her neighbors the Kings.

She asked if this could be added to the taxes over a period of time?

Torgerson answered that at the regular meeting the council would determine the length of time and % of what interest.

Merlin Thoen owner of the Guest Haus questioned why there had to be sidewalk on the west side, and if grass could be planted instead.

O'Connor commented that on the south side of Hwy 16 it was for public safety. Hanson stated that on a major highway it's more compelling to have sidewalks there. Drake said he would rather see people walking on sidewalks rather than the street. In the ordinance it is stated that residential areas the property owner pays 50% of the cost, and in commercial areas the property owner is responsible for 100% of the cost. Hanson made a motion to approve the list that was presented and include the west of the Thoen's property and treat it as residential, which changes his cost to \$1,621.65 and also to take 3 feet from the Gruett's bill, second Halvorson, motion carried.

Doris Grindland wondered if it would be feasible put in a cement slab instead of the steps at the corner on Parkway by her place to make it easier for people with strollers. In discussion the area was defined as being too steep.

Street Superintendent Andy will contact the State Highway Dept. and look into the matter.

## Persons with business before the council

Dave Applen / Matt Thompson- Skate Park

Matt Thompson presented himself to the council to tell about the need, he feels along with several other young people from the community, for a skate park.

Thompson said that skateboarding is a growing sport. Many area towns could use the park, and it could be used as a tourism attraction. Having a skateboard park would eliminate skating on private property.

Dave Applen said that they have approached the Swim & Rec Committee and they have offered to donate \$55,000 for the equipment.

Applen felt that it would make things much easier for the young people since they would not have to drive to the larger Cities.

They are looking at the Bass pond parking lot or the grassy area to the west for a location. They are not requesting any financial support from the City, but they are requesting land/property and ongoing maintenance

Torgerson researched the insurance side of it and if the park is a Tier 1, the City's insurance would cover it.

She also included information from the League of Minnesota Cities which strongly recommends signs requesting protective equipment such as helmets and pads, and stating that skating is at ones own risk. After completion it would be turned over to the City. Applen stated the equipment has a 5 year warranty and may require periodic maintenance, along with a concrete pad, signage, shelter for shade, water and a port-a potty

He said the kids are willing to do fund raising along with helping with garbage control. Hanson questioned the loss of several parking spaces and whether the equipment could be moved or not.

Torgerson will talk to the DNR about the parking lot usage to see if it would be feasible to them. She encouraged them to meet with the Park Board with their plans, and will put Skate Park on the next agenda for the City council meeting.

# Bethlehem Lutheran Church Auction- Marge Drake

Hanson made motion to approve using the backside of the parking lot for an auction fundraiser on Oct. 2, 2004 for the Church, second O'Connor, motion carried.

# Robbie Wagner-Jim Wagner Petition of City Limits

Manion researched the laws of establishing rural and urban service districts and detachment from the City. Minnesota Statutes 1961, Section 473.02 states that once a parcel in the City is developed it can no longer come under a rural taxing district, as it is then developed for residential purposes.

Robbie Wagner feels that he receives no services from the City.

He has 5 acres and his father owns 25 acres that he also wants petitioned out. The land is agriculture and some is pasture.

James Wagner referenced the retabling of the petition out when he questioned why are minutes approved than reconsidered, what good are approved minutes? What by-laws or rules of order does the council go by? Roberts Rules? Manion commented that they never really adopted Roberts Rules.

Halvorson commented the way it is written in the minutes right now is the way it should be, what is there to consider? (Being there wasn't a full council was one reason it was voted on to be reconsidered.)

O'Connor made motion not to support the detachment for the Jim & Kim Wagner residential property, supporting Minn. Stat.414.06, second Hanson, and motion carried.

Drake & Halvorson- opposed

O'Connor made the motion to approve the 25 acres of land of Jim Wagner's, with a resolution supporting the detachment along with the Mayors and City Administrator signatures, second Drake, motion carried.

O'Connor made motion not to support the detachment of 5 acres for Robbie Wagner, being it is already developed, second Hanson, motion failed.

Drake made motion for a signed resolution with proper signatures by the Mayor and City Administrator for detachment of the 5 acres for Robbie Wagner, second Halverson motion carried. O'Connor & Hanson-opposed

# ATTACHMENT D

CHAPTER 7

## 3. Special motions

Several motions deserve special consideration. They include the following:

#### a. The motion to reconsider

This motion enables a council to set aside a vote it previously took, and to reconsider the matter as though it had not voted on the issue. If the council uses *Roberts Rules*, only a person who originally voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider. Otherwise, any member may make the motion by saying, "I move to reconsider . . . stating the motion to be reconsidered . . ." The council may debate the motion. If the council passes the motion to reconsider, it must then reconsider the original motion and take another vote. If the council defeats a motion to reconsider, no further action is necessary.

#### b. A motion to postpone indefinitely

There is an important difference between the motion to postpone indefinitely and the motion to postpone temporarily. The motion to postpone temporarily is more commonly called a motion to "lay on the table" or "to table." The motion to postpone temporarily, postpones consideration of the motion until some undetermined, future time. The council may consider a tabled motion whenever a majority of the members decide to do so. A motion to postpone indefinitely, however, is the equivalent to a negative vote on the main motion. Thus, the issue can be raised again only by a motion made by someone on the prevailing side of the vote. And unless someone changes his or her mind, the motion to postpone will once again prevail. A motion to permanently suppress any future consideration of an issue is not binding on a future council.

#### c. A motion to limit debate

A council may limit debate by placing a time limit on it, such as a limit of 15 minutes to consider a particular motion; or limiting the number of people who may speak for and against a certain motion, such as a limit of three speakers in favor and three speakers opposed.
